Dear Community Members,

Thank you, community, for your overwhelming support for our school, as demonstrated by the successful budget approval!

One of our core philosophies is that children are more likely to excel academically and socially when all their basic needs - food, water, and shelter - are met. However, let's not forget about the fourth necessity: love. Humans have an innate drive to belong to something, and when students, staff, and the school community work together as a true team to fulfill these needs, the impossible becomes possible!

Switching gears: A quick update on our Capital Improvement Project:

- We are currently about four months behind our planned timeline. The New York State Education Department, like many others, is experiencing labor shortages, which has caused delays in the approval process. We will be going out to bid as soon as possible.
- However, we were able to align construction on the new playground to begin as soon as we receive approval.
 While we hope to complete this work before the start of the school year, it is more likely that the new facility will not

- Next summer (2025) will focus on the majority of classroom construction.



A Difference Maker

Honoring the Career of Mrs. Wendy Clark

fter three decades of service in the Fillmore Central School District, Mrs. Wendy Clark stepped away from full-time teaching this past winter. While her retirement is well deserved, her dedication to the faculty, staff, and students of Fillmore Central School will be missed by those she worked with on a daily basis. Simply put, Wendy made a difference. Careful planning and attention to detail led to lessons filled with engaging projects, allowing her to maximize the academic potential of her students. A generation of students will never forget their Native American history unit as a result of the famous long house project, or advances in technology, the economy, and growth of towns throughout upstate New York that were generated from the creation of canals and railroads. But more important than any academic legacy is the positive and welcoming environment she created for all students in her classroom. Students left her class

each day feeling valued and cared for, a legacy of even greater significance than their knowledge pertaining to a particular mule named Sal hauling lumber, coal, and hay for fifteen miles on the Erie Canal.

The classroom was just one place where she made a difference in the lives of students. She spent time advising classes, directing plays and musicals, and coaching volleyball. Her no-nonsense approach to activities allowed her teams and casts to flourish. She was happy to be the one to set the stage at a young age for budding actors, actresses, and athletes to develop and grow, and is one of countless individuals in the building who help to build the foundation in elementary and junior high that is needed for our extracurriculars to thrive at the high school level. Whether it be chaperoning a sporting event or doing committee work throughout the building, Wendy was the rare person who was happy to serve behind the scenes to make the

experience for students as optimal as it could be, regardless

of whether or not she received the credit she was due.

As I transitioned from student to colleague, I valued the conversations Wendy had with me. They were practical, honest, and supportive of the underlying goal she has modeled for her students and committed her life to at Fillmore: going forth to serve. As a result, it is no surprise to me that she is back in the building part-time, mentoring our newest cohort of teachers, trying to maintain best practices for providing highquality and caring instruction that she has always stood for. It is with all of this in mind that I thank Mrs. Wendy Clark on behalf of countless students, colleagues, and friends for her tireless dedication to Fillmore Central School. We wish you all the best in your retirement.













MEDICATION & TREATMENT ADMINISTRATION POLICIES

The NY State Education Department regulates the administration of all medications (prescription and over-the-counter, including cough drops) and has detailed regulations in the administration of medications in public and private schools. Our Policies below are based on those mandates.

- Parents and physicians are required to attempt to arrange all medication/treatment administration around school hours. Drugs requiring three times a day administration are to be given before school, after school and before bedtime.
- All physicians' orders must be in writing; verbal physician orders are not accepted.
- The School Nurse (or trained school personnel under the supervision of the school nurse) must administer all prescriptions and over-the-counter medications.
- All medication is administered in the Nurse's Office. Parents arriving at school to administer medication to their child must do so in the Nurse's Office.
- ❖ Narcotic (opiate) medications, such as Vicodin (hydrocodone), Oxycontin (oxycodone), etc. are very potent pain relievers. No child taking these medications is allowed to come to school while taking them. These drugs will not be administered at school, are not to be brought to school, or taken when coming to school, to do so is in direct violation of our school policies.
- ❖ All medications, whether prescription or over-the-counter, (OTC medications include but are not limited to: Tylenol, Advil, cough drops, Chloraseptic, Anbesol, topical ointments and sun screen) requires a physicians order for school administration as well as parental consent. When a child has multiple medications each medication ordered requires a separate form. Forms are available on the school web site and the school nurse's office.

- The physicians order must include the name of the student, the name of the medication, doses, route, and time to be administered during the school day.
- It is the parents/guardians responsibility to be aware of any expiration dates on medications they provide for school administration and to provide the school with up-todate medication prior to any expiration dates.
- Management plans (diabetic, asthmatic, allergy, etc.) are not acceptable physician orders. Physician order forms are required for all medications and treatments.
- All medications, including overthe-counter medications, are to be delivered to the school nurse by a parent. This is state law. Please, DO NOT send any medication to school with the student.
- Medications need to be in original prescription bottle(s) or original over-the-counter bottle(s). Pharmacies will provide "school bottles" if requested. The container must be properly labeled with the students name, name of medicine, dose and time to be administered.
- All medication is kept in the Nurse's office. No student is to carry any medications, prescribed or over-the-counter, on their persons, in their backpacks, or lockers.
- Children with life threatening issues who must carry emergency medications on their persons are allowed to do so only with physician and parent written authorization.

- The school has a nebulizing machine so students with the appropriate physician orders and parent consent may receive these treatments during school. Parents are required to provide the individual tubing, medication reservoirs, and any associated medications.
- New medications orders must be provided for each school year. All medication orders expire the last day of school at which time all medications must be picked up by parents/ responsible adult. Any medication not retrieved after close of school on the last day of school is destroyed. **Discontinued medications** must be retrieved by parent/ quardian within one week of discontinuation. After seven days medication will be destroyed.
- Our school physician provides standing orders for over-thecounter medications for pain relief and fever. The purpose of these medications are to assist children to complete the school day when suffering minor headaches, pain, menstrual cramps, etc. These medications are available to students only with parental written request. The Standing Order Parental Permit forms can be found on your child's SNAP portal through the nurse's office.
- Our school physician will also provide a Non-Patient Specific order for anaphylactic agents (epinephrine, Benadryl), Albuterol Metered Dose Inhalers and liquid Albuterol for use in a nebulizer. This order is for emergencies only.

2024-25 School Year New York State Immunization Requirements for School Entrance/Attendance¹

NOTES:

All children must be age-appropriately immunized to attend school in New York State. The number of doses depends on the schedule recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP). Intervals between doses of vaccine must be in accordance with the "ACIP-Recommended Child and Adolescent Immunization Schedule." Doses received before the minimum age or intervals are not valid and do not count toward the number of doses listed below. See footnotes for specific information for each vaccine. Children who are enrolling in grade-less classes must meet the immunization requirements of the grades for which they are age equivalent.

- 1. Demonstrated serologic evidence of measles, mumps or rubella antibodies or laboratory confirmation of these diseases is acceptable proof of immunity to these diseases. Serologic tests for polio are acceptable proof of immunity only if the test was performed before September 1, 2019, and all three serotypes were positive. A positive blood test for hepatitis B surface antibody is acceptable proof of immunity to hepatitis B. Demonstrated serologic evidence of varicella antibodies, laboratory confirmation of varicella disease or diagnosis by a physician, physician assistant or nurse practitioner that a child has had varicella disease is acceptable proof of immunity to varicella.
- Diphtheria and tetanus toxoids and acellular pertussis (DTaP) vaccine. (Minimum age: 6 weeks)
 - a. Children starting the series on time should receive a 5-dose series of DTaP vaccine at 2 months, 4 months, 6 months and at 15 through 18 months and at 4 years or older. The fourth dose may be received as early as age 12 months, provided at least 6 months have elapsed since the third dose. However, the fourth dose of DTaP need not be repeated if it was administered at least 4 months after the third dose of DTaP. The final dose in the series must be received on or after the fourth birthday and at least 6 months after the previous dose.
 - b. If the fourth dose of DTaP was administered at 4 years or older, and at least 6 months after dose 3, the fifth (booster) dose of DTaP vaccine is not required.
 - c. Children 7 years and older who are not fully immunized with the childhood DTaP vaccine series should receive Tdap vaccine as the first dose in the catch-up series; if additional doses are needed, use Td or Tdap vaccine. If the first dose was received before their first birthday, then 4 doses are required, as long as the final dose was received at 4 years or older. If the first dose was received on or after the first birthday, then 3 doses are required, as long as the final dose was received at 4 years or older.
- Tetanus and diphtheria toxoids and acellular pertussis (Tdap) adolescent booster vaccine. (Minimum age for grades 6 through 10: 10 years; minimum age for grades 11 and 12: 7 years).
 - a. Students 11 years or older entering grades 6 through 12 are required to have one dose of Tdap.
 - b. In addition to the grade 6 through 12 requirement, Tdap may also be given as part of the catch-up series for students 7 years of age and older who are not fully immunized with the childhood DTaP series, as described above. In school year 2024-25, only doses of Tdap given at age 10 years or older will satisfy the Tdap requirement for students in grades 6 through 10; however, doses of Tdap given at age 7 years or older will satisfy the requirement for students in grades 11 and 12.
 - Students who are 10 years old in grade 6 and who have not yet received a Tdap vaccine are in compliance until they turn 11 years old.
- 4. Inactivated polio vaccine (IPV) or oral polio vaccine (OPV). (Minimum age: 6 weeks)
 - a. Children starting the series on time should receive a series of IPV at 2 months, 4 months and at 6 through 18 months, and at 4 years or older. The final dose in the series must be received on or after the fourth birthday and at least 6 months after the previous dose.
 - b. For students who received their fourth dose before age 4 and prior to August 7, 2010, 4 doses separated by at least 4 weeks is sufficient.
 - If the third dose of polio vaccine was received at 4 years or older and at least 6 months after the previous dose, the fourth dose of polio vaccine is not required.
 - d. For children with a record of OPV, only trivalent OPV (tOPV) counts toward New York State school polio vaccine requirements. Doses of OPV given before April 1, 2016, should be counted unless specifically noted as monovalent, bivalent or as given during a poliovirus immunization campaign. Doses of OPV given on or after April 1, 2016, must not be counted.
- 5. Measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine. (Minimum age: 12 months)
 - a. The first dose of MMR vaccine must have been received on or after the first birthday. The second dose must have been received at least 28 days (4 weeks) after the first dose to be considered valid.
 - Measles: One dose is required for pre-kindergarten. Two doses are required for grades kindergarten through 12.
 - Mumps: One dose is required for pre-kindergarten. Two doses are required for grades kindergarten through 12.
 - d. Rubella: At least one dose is required for all grades (pre-kindergarten through 12).

- 6. Hepatitis B vaccine
 - a. Dose 1 may be given at birth or anytime thereafter. Dose 2 must be given at least 4 weeks (28 days) after dose 1. Dose 3 must be at least 8 weeks after dose 2 AND at least 16 weeks after dose 1 AND no earlier than age 24 weeks (when 4 doses are given, substitute "dose 4" for "dose 3" in these calculations).
 - b. Two doses of adult hepatitis B vaccine (Recombivax) received at least 4 months apart at age 11 through 15 years will meet the requirement.
- 7. Varicella (chickenpox) vaccine. (Minimum age: 12 months)
 - a. The first dose of varicella vaccine must have been received on or after the first birthday. The second dose must have been received at least 28 days (4 weeks) after the first dose to be considered valid.
 - For children younger than 13 years, the recommended minimum interval between doses is 3 months (if the second dose was administered at least 4 weeks after the first dose, it can be accepted as valid); for persons 13 years and older, the minimum interval between doses is 4 weeks.
- 8. Meningococcal conjugate ACWY vaccine (MenACWY). (Minimum age for grades 7 through 11: 10 years; minimum age for grade 12: 6 weeks).
 - a. One dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine (Menactra, Menveo or MenQuadfi) is required for students entering grades 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11.
 - For students in grade 12, if the first dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine was received at 16 years or older, the second (booster) dose is not required.
 - c. The second dose must have been received at 16 years or older. The minimum interval between doses is 8 weeks.
- Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) conjugate vaccine. (Minimum age: 6 weeks)
 - a. Children starting the series on time should receive Hib vaccine at 2 months, 4 months, 6 months and at 12 through 15 months. Children older than 15 months must get caught up according to the ACIP catch-up schedule. The final dose must be received on or after 12 months.
 - b. If 2 doses of vaccine were received before age 12 months, only 3 doses are required with dose 3 at 12 through 15 months and at least 8 weeks after dose 2.
 - c. If dose 1 was received at age 12 through 14 months, only 2 doses are required with dose 2 at least 8 weeks after dose 1.
 - d. If dose 1 was received at 15 months or older, only 1 dose is required.
 - e. Hib vaccine is not required for children 5 years or older.
 - f. For further information, refer to the CDC Catch-Up Guidance for Healthy Children 4 Months through 4 Years of Age.
- 10. Pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV). (Minimum age: 6 weeks)
 - a. Children starting the series on time should receive PCV vaccine at 2 months, 4 months, 6 months and at 12 through 15 months. Children older than 15 months must get caught up according to the ACIP catch-up schedule. The final dose must be received on or after 12 months.
 - Unvaccinated children ages 7 through 11 months are required to receive 2 doses, at least 4 weeks apart, followed by a third dose at 12 through 15 months.
 - Unvaccinated children ages 12 through 23 months are required to receive 2 doses of vaccine at least 8 weeks apart.
 - If one dose of vaccine was received at 24 months or older, no further doses are required.
 - e. PCV is not required for children 5 years or older.
 - For further information, refer to the CDC Catch-Up Guidance for Healthy Children 4 Months through 4 Years of Age.

Registration for both 3PK and UPK (4-year-old) programs are open. If your child was born between December 2, 2020 and December 1, 2021 he or she is eligible to participate in the 3PK program here at Fillmore. Students that are eligible to participate in UPK should have birthdates between December 2, 2019 and December 1, 2020. These programs are excellent opportunities for children to enhance their language, socialization and emotional regulation skills while developing foundational academic skills. Transportation is available for the UPK program. If transportation is a barrier for your child participating in the 3PK program please contact Mr. Talbot at 585-567-2289.



SCHOOL ENTRY PHYSICAL REQUIREMENTS

New York State law requires a health examination for all students entering the school district for the first time and when entering Pre-K or K, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 11th grade.

The examination must be completed by a New York State licensed physician, physician assistant or nurse practitioner and on the approved NYSED Student Health Examination Form for School.

A copy of the health examination must be provided to the school within 30 days from when your child first starts at the school, and when your child starts K , 1st , 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, & 11th grades

STUDENT ATHLETE PHYSICAL REQUIREMENTS

All school physicals will need to be done by your child's primary care physician. This includes your child's sports physical. Sports physicals must be completed every 366 days to remain eligible for participation in sports.

- · If your child is entering grades 7th, 9th or 11th they will have to do a classroom physical for school entry. This same physical and form will also be used for their sports physical.

IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS

6th Graders

The NY state Department of Health requires all students entering 6th grade to have the Tdap vaccine for school entry.

- Students in 6th grade or a comparable age-level special education school program and who are 11 years or older must receive an immunization containing tetanus toxoids, diphtheria, and acellular pertussis (Tdap).
- If a student has received a Td, DT, or DTaP vaccination within the last two years, the student's Tdap vaccine should be deferred until a period of two years has elapsed.
- 10-year-old students who are entering 6th grade will not be required to receive a Tdap vaccine and will not be excluded from school, <u>but they must be flagged</u>, <u>tracked and immunized when they</u> turn 11 years old.

If you have any questions please call the nurse's office at 567-8584. It is very important you have this done right away.

7th & 12th Graders

NY State Department of Health requires all students entering 7th grade

to have 1 Meningococcal Vaccine. All students entering 12th grade must have 2 Meningococcal Vaccine.

- Any student entering 7th grade must receive this vaccine before the start of school in September 2024.
- Any student entering 12th grade must receive the 2nd vaccine before the start of school in September 2024. If the first vaccine was given after age 16 only 1 vaccine is required.
- Without this vaccine your child will not be enrolled in school in the fall and they will not be permitted to begin the school year.
- Please forward all vaccine information to the school nurses' office.

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Fillmore Youth Fight Back Against Tobacco Giant Altria

More than fifty youth gathered in Washington D.C. to protest Altria Group, Inc.'s shareholder meeting and expose Big Tobacco's lies and schemes to addict kids

ayden Marshall of Fillmore Central School joined more than fifty youth and advocates from 9 national organizations to rally at Altria Group, Inc.'s 2024 Annual Meeting of Shareholders. These young people and adults held a demonstration outside Altria's Lobbyist Office, Washington, D.C. office, while several youth activists were designees to directly address Altria's CEO Billy Gifford and ask questions during the virtual shareholders' meeting. Altria's messaging and the movement of youth to using vaping and nicotine pouches, helped create the theme of this year's Mobilize Against Tobacco Lies event which was "Same Snake, Different Skin" referencing that the tobacco industry might be promoting alternative products to traditional cigarettes, but all these products contain nicotine, many higher than cigarettes and come in appealing flavors to youth.

This year marks the ninth consecutive year that Mobilize Against Tobacco Lies (MATL), a collaborative of youth programs and national partners, gathered to expose and fight back against the tobacco giant's lies.

Reality Check youth from across New York State rallied with a collaborative of tobacco control youth programs including Dover Youth to Youth of New Hampshire, Traditional Tobacco Voices in Minnesota, and national partners; Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, American Indian Cancer Foundation, Corporate Accountability, Counter Tools, Center for Black Health and Equity, and the Truth Initiative.


Altria and its Philip Morris USA subsidiary sell the number one most popular cigarette brand among kids, Marlboro, and its John Middleton subsidiary sells one of the most popular cigar brands among kids, Black and Mild, US Smokeless Tobacco subsidiary sells the top two smokeless tobacco brands Copenhagen and Skoal. Altria has a long history of targeting vulnerable populations with its products and invested in Juul at the height of the youth e-cigarette epidemic. Altria in 2023 sold its percentage of ownership in JUUL as it's popularity has fallen and has failed to get Food and Drug Administration approval and purchased NJOY Holdings, Inc. Altria claims to be "moving beyond smoking," but the truth is that they make most of their revenue from cigarettes and fight real efforts to reduce smoking – such as bans on menthol cigarettes. Altria and the other big tobacco companies quote youth smoking rates are at alltime lows, but youth consumption of nicotine has not declined as they have moved to as Altria claims "potentially less harmful products", such as vaping and nicotine pouches.

Despite Altria and the tobacco industry's efforts, the United States has made great progress to reduce youth smoking. However, the latest government survey shows that 2.8 million U.S middle and high school students still use tobacco products, including 2.13 million who use e-cigarettes.

Reality Check is a teen-led, adult-run program that seeks to prevent and decrease tobacco use among young people throughout New York State. For

Reality Check New York empowers youth to become leaders in their community in exposing what they see as the manipulative and deceptive marketing tactics of the tobacco industry. The organization's members produce change in their communities through grassroots mobilization and education. Reality Check in this area is affiliated with Tobacco-Free Chautauqua, Cattaraugus and Allegany (TF-CCA), a program of Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center.

The NYS Tobacco Control Program is made up of a network of statewide contractors who work on Advancing Tobacco-Free Communities, which includes Community Engagement and Reality Check, the Health Systems for a Tobacco-Free New York, the NYS Smokers' Quitline and Surveillance and Research. In your Welcome to SNAP Parent Portal email, you will be provided with a temporary password

and instructions on how to log in, similar to below:

After logging into the SNAP Health Portal, the first thing you will see is the Dashboard. This is the front page of the SNAP Health Portal. School specific announcements can be found here, as well as alerts and/or required actions pertaining to your specific student(s).

If you have more than one student in the Fillmore school district, you will need to go to the top left corner to click on **Select Child** to assess each student's individual record. You can toggle between your students to check for new information or alerts.

On the left-hand side of the dashboard, you can navigate through the following sections:

Demographics and Contacts

 This section includes your address, primary phone number, and other pertinent contact information.
 This information is pre-populated from our main student database, PowerSchool. You will NOT be able to make demographic or contact information changes through the SNAP parent portal. Changes to your contact information should be submitted through our registration office.

Health Conditions

- Use this tab to check current health information. If the information is correct, press the CONFIRM button at the top of the screen.
- For any new medical condition, click on ADD in the top right corner to add health conditions. Select the appropriate condition from the drop-down box and provide any pertinent details you would like to share. To provide written documentation from your child's healthcare provider, please click Choose File and upload the document.
- To edit a previously listed condition or remove a condition, please select the Edit Icon. Make any changes or uncheck the current condition box. Click Save once you are finished.

Vaccines

With this tab, you can attach copies
of all vaccination records from your
student's healthcare provider or
immunization clinic. To attach your
student's immunization record, click
Attach Documentation and upload
the immunization record.

Medications

- With this tab, you can see all medication orders your student currently has on file. This is also where you can authorize the administration of district over the counter medications provided on an "as needed" basis.
- On the right-hand side click OTCs and OPT-IN to any medications you want your student to be permitted to receive as needed.

 For students who require daily medication at school you can upload the order directly into SNAP. Select orders and then click upload.

 Currently this section is only being used on a limited basis. This section may not pertain to your child

Screenings

- This tab allows you to view physicals that are currently on file for your student.
- You can attach documentation from a healthcare provider when an updated physical is needed.
- NYS requires physicals for all new students. NYS also requires all students in grades Pre-K, K,1,3,5,7,9, &11 to have an up-to-date physical. This physical is to be completed by your child's primary care physician.
- All Athletes playing in any sport in grades 7th-12th will also need a physical every year. Your child will not need two physicals to participate in a sport. The grade physical may also be used as the sports physical.

 Within this tab, you will be able to contact the school nurse at any time during the school year and will alert the school nurse with any messages you send.
